The All School Reunion Is Back For 2023!






Rev. Micheal "Bruce" Johnson Class of 1955

While Bruce is known as "Fr. Michael" in the Orthodox Church, he is still "Bruce" to his family and long-time friends. He was born in Seattle in 1938 and moved to West Seattle in 1942. 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
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

was soon chosen as drum major of the band, a post he held for the next four years. Eventually, Bruce also became concertmaster of the orchestra. After four musical years at West Seattle, Bruce graduated in 1955 as valedictorian of his class. Meanwhile, Bruce earned a scholarship to Williams College in Williamstown, Mass. He completed his freshman and sophomore years "back East," but knowing that he would end up living in Seattle, Bruce transferred to the University of Washington, where he graduated cum laude in 1959 with a degree in literature.

In 1962 Bruce entered the Eastern Orthodox Church, specifically the Orthodox Church in America. Here he was ordained to the priesthood in 1973. In 1992 "Fr. Michael" transferred to the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America, where he is now a retired priest.

From 1970 to 1990, Bruce enjoyed a career in marketing and public relations with the local telephone company. At the same time, he served the Church, primarily as an assistant pastor and youth minister. In 1990 Bruce accepted an early retirement offer from secular employment, and became a full-time clergyman. During the next 13 years, he served as executive director of All Saints Camp and Retreat Center near Gig Harbor, as pastor of St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church in Tacoma, and was founding pastor of Holy Apostles Greek Orthodox Parish in Shoreline.

As a youth, Bruce was a member of Alki Troop 281, and in1955, he attained the rank of Eagle Scout. Today, Bruce is a 59-year veteran of the Boy Scouts of America, having received a number of recognitions for his service to youth. This includes the Silver Beaver, the highest honor a local Scout council can grant to an adult leader, as well as the Prophet Elias award, the highest recognition the Orthodox Church can bestow on an adult leader in Scouting. Through the years, Bruce has never forgotten the words he first pledged in the Scout Oath at age eleven. These include, "to help other people at all times."

On October 9, 2017, a sunny national holiday, Bruce was walking home through a quiet neighborhood near the West Seattle Library, when he suddenly heard a woman screaming for help. Her face was bloodied and she was being pursued by another woman, holding a large knife and shouting at her. As it turned out the victim had been pushing her one-year-old son in a carriage on her way to Metropolitan Market when without warning, the assailant ran up from behind

He and his sister Joan graduated from West Seattle High School in 1955 and 1957 respectively. During high school he was a photographer for school publications and co-editor of the 1955 Kimtah.

While he was still a student at the University of Washington, he began his life's career at The Boeing Company. When he graduated with degrees in mechanical (1959) and industrial engineering (1961), he went to work full time at the company, and eventually spent six years overseas representing Boeing in London and Amsterdam.

In 1982 Boeing named John to manage the team of specialists who investigate airplane accidents. He personally investigated more than 17 major accidents and led the investigations of more than 250 other major accidents and more than 2500 other events around the globe. He represented the company at public hearings with regulatory agencies. His role in coordinating the implementation of safety recommendations with design, maintenance and operations engineers has made a vital contribution to the safety of the world's fleet and to the flying public.

By the time he retired in 1998, he had earned a highly respected reputation in the complex, technical world of aviation safety. Called the "dean of commercial jet accident investigations," accolades lauding his technical and people skills flooded in from the Federal Aviation Agency, the National Transportation Safety Board, countless Boeing customers and other investigative agencies around the world.

After retiring he formed a consulting business, while teaching and speaking on behalf of aviation safety to groups around the world, in affiliation with the Southern California Safety Institute and as a Distinguished Lecturer for the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics. Even today, he is frequently sought after by news sources to provide expert background information for their stories.

John has established fellowships for graduate students in Mechanical Engineering and Nursing and a scholarship for Industrial Engineering, all at the University of Washington.

John is a Fellow of the International Society of Air Safety Investigators (ISASI). He holds professional engineer and private pilot licenses. Today, he devotes hundreds of hours each year to the Museum of Flight, serving as a teacher and docent. For nine year he was a Trustee on their Board, recently graduating to Emeritus Trustee. In the past, he also served on the small but devoted team of 1955 West Seattle grads who plan their periodic reunions.

A reception will be held on June 17, 2023 to honor the West Seattle High School's Hall of Fame inductees who missed out on public recognition because of the covid pandemic. Although there will be an All-School Reunion (ASR) this year, the theatre portion of the program has been eliminated due to declining attendance. The event will take place from 2-5 PM in the social hall of St John the Baptist Episcopal Church, 3050 California Ave SW (right next door to the high school).

Hall of Fame recipients from 2020, 2021, 2022 and this year, 2023, will be the guests of honor, along with their families and friends.

Those being formally recognized are Christy (Young) Rowe from the class of 1972, Dennis Madsen from the class of 1966, David Townsend from the class of 1971, Ralph Braseth from the class of 1976, Carol Ann (Sharp) Thornton from the class of 1971, John Purvis from the class of 1955 and Bruce Johnson, also from the class of 1955. David Foster, a 2021 inductee from the class of 1958 has since passed away.

Hall of Fame VP Ted Foss will present each honoree with a brief introduction.

Hall of Fame Nomination Information

Hall of Fame nomination forms will be accepted anytime until December. Next January, the WSHS Alumni Association Board will review the nominations and select four finalists for the board and Class Reps to vote on at the February meeting. One or two finalists will win the Hall of Fame Award for 2024 and will be notified soon thereafter. Each winner will be honored at the ASR planned for 2024.

All nominations received but not selected, will be kept on file and reconsidered for the next year.

Diego Escame-Hedger WSHS 2022




Rhiannon Hayes-McQueen WSHS 2022



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



Tom Collier - 2015 Hall of Fame Professor Emeritus of Music at University of Washington School of Music



Although I rarely had an opportunity to play music in front of live audiences in 2022, I did have a good year in the recording studio. My solo marimba album, "The Color of Wood", was released on the Summit label in April. The recording received good music journal reviews and quite a bit of radio airplay, mostly on American NPR and college radio stations, as well as a few European jazz stations. The album was placed on the first-round 2023 GRAMMY award ballot for Best Ambient/New Age Instrumental album. One of the selections on the album, "Five Reflections on Wood", was nominated for best jazz

instrumental. Three of the reflections – or movements – were inspired by classmates Adelle Comfort Hermann (a short sunset video), Ruthi Winter Sundnes (a painting by her late sister, Karen), and Jim Burdette (his cabin on beautiful Horsehead Bay). Although neither nomination made it past the first round of voting, I was pleased to receive that early ballot recognition by the Recording Academy.

Throughout the summer, I spent a lot of time in my studio recording music for a series of albums to be released in 2023 and 2024 on Summit Records. The music on this extended project has me playing a multitude of instruments on each song through the process of overdubbing – or multi-tracking. I've been doing that type of recording since my senior year at WSHS, but I have to say that the process is much easier utilizing computer-based recording software as opposed





In October of 2022, my husband Mike and I took a 3 week trip to Ecuador with an overseas adventure travel group. The country of Ecuador has much to offer. First of all, to travel to Ecuador you don't need a Visa and the currency is US dollars. So all you need to do is make a plane reservation and fly to Quito... easy! Quito is a high elevation city of 9,350 feet above sea level. Before this trip was over we would spend time at sea level in the Galapagos Islands and then travel up to 14,000 feet in the Andean mountains, so we got to see a variety of scenery.

After spending a few days in Quito, we flew to Coca in the Amazon rain forest. We stayed in a lodge on the Napo River, a branch of the Amazon River. Our only mode of transportation in the rain forest jungle was by canoe. We visited native villages and every day we took nature trips to find colorful birds and animals that live in the jungle! Life in the rain for-

est was peaceful. We only heard the sounds of birds and animals, so of course I loved the Amazon! Our home was a small ship that took us around all the islands for a week. Here we saw unusual animals that only exist in the Galapagos Islands including the giant tortoises, blue footed Boobies, etc. I found the animals almost tame; at least they were oblivious of human beings! I could walk right up to a Boobie, frigate bird, iguana, giant tortoise, sea turtles, sea lion mothers nursing babies, and they could not care less that we were there! They didn't move an inch! Even the sea lions would play with the snorkelers, nibbling on the fins for fun! These birds and animals have no predators, so they weren't afraid of anything.. amazing!

We then flew to Quito and started a 5 day bus trip through the mountains of the Andes, visiting villages and talking to locals along the way. Andean ladies wore fedora hats, ponchos and colorful, gathered skirts and the men wore red ponchos also with fedora hats. They were colorful people! Now for food... In the Amazon rainforest a popular food was a large beetle larva... like a big yellow worm! They barbecued them on a stick. Some said they tasted like chicken, but they were so gross that I couldn't eat them! Outside of the rainforest, the most popular dinner food was guinea pig! Yes, those sweet, cute guinea pigs! There were guinea pig restaurants everywhere! Otherwise the food was great.

Remember those senior accolades handed out at the end of each school year? Is there any validity to those "Most likely to . . ." awards voted on by one's class peers? The class of '73 had three ladies, good friends of one another, who proved their fellow classmates right.

Lisa Bergman was chosen "Most Likely to Succeed." How did we know that one day Lisa would become a classical pianist who played worldwide, including at Carnegie Hall? From her bio on Seattle's classical KING FM 98.1 station, where she is a popular radio host: "She is a graduate of the Juilliard School, the State University of New York at Stony Brook and the University of Washington, cum laude. For 10 years she served as an Artist in Residence and faculty member at the University of Washington

School of Music (1989-1999). She is a member of the Hall of Fame for the Washington State Music Teachers Association . . ." And in 2018, Lisa was the first member of the class of '73 to be inducted into the West Seattle Alumni Association Hall of Fame.

Lisa's good friend **Laurie (Sleight) Kleespies** since their early years at Gatewood Elementary School, was voted "Best Female Athlete" by her senior classmates. The class of '73 was the first one to benefit from the passage of Title IX which prohibited discrimination based on sex in education programs and activities that receive federal financial assistance. Laurie was the lone daughter in the family. Her three brothers, Don ('59), Randy ('71), and twin Dick ('73) earned a dozen West Seattle varsity letters between them in Cross Country, Soccer, Swimming, Tennis, and Track & Field. But until her senior year, Laurie was not allowed to compete at the varsity level in the sports in which she excelled. In her junior year, Laurie was invited to join the boys tennis team, as there was no girls team at the time. Before the first match,

the principals of the Seattle School District voted that girls could not play with the boys. Title IX was passed that summer on June 23, 1972. In Laurie's senior year, she was the captain of the newly formed girls tennis team and was voted its most inspirational player. She also lettered in swimming that first year it became a varsity sport. Laurie's letter sweater is now preserved as property of Seattle's Museum of History and Industry (MOHAI).

After high school, Laurie attended the University of Washington, then graduated from the Walter Reed Army Institute of Nursing (WRAIN). Laurie's Army career as a medical/surgical nurse included hospital postings in Missouri and California. Captain Kleespies is pictured here in 1983 in her dress blues.

Laurie's friend, and eventually her sister-inlaw, is **Nancy (Rutherford) Sleight**. Nancy was voted Most Accomplished by her classmates. She played oboe in the orchestra, earned All-Metro status in Gymnastics with top finishes in multiple events including the All-Around competition. One of the cheerleaders, Nancy also was one of the school's valedictorians.

She attended Cottey College in Nevada, Missouri until she ran out of Math classes to take. She returned to Seattle, joined the Seattle Pacific University varsity gymnastics team, and went on to graduate magna cum laude in Mathematics. She had planned to become a high school teacher until the

Regional Manager of IBM specifically asked her to apply with Big Blue. Nancy had a successful career as a Systems Engineer with IBM until she embarked on the "domestic engineer" path, raising three scholar-athletes of her own. Nancy is now a member and regular attender of the West Seattle High School Monogram Club, the organization of West Seattle varsity athletes who graduated at least forty years ago. She welcomes any of her varsity sisters to join her.

As long as you are listed by the Alumni Association as a member of the class, you will be approved, even if you don't answer the three questions correctly.

Back to Ukraine, Nick Sweeney shared some amazing stories of his work there. Nick graduated from George Fox with a degree in Education and from Seattle U with a Master's in Educational Administration. He says he has served as the Lord's imperfect servant, mostly as a school administrator with his last assignment being in Ukraine. He became the director of the school in Kyiv, Ukraine for the last two years. Nick was an administrator at a school in Seattle that took part in a request from the Ukrainian government which thought it would be a good idea for children who lived through the disaster at Chernobyl to interact with American kids. He arrived in Ukraine just when the country was experiencing Covid, a bit behind the rest of the world. By the fall of the 2021-2022 school year, they were able to resume classes at the school once again. Little did we know as we began the second semester in January 2022, we started receiving messages from the US Embassy that a real danger was developing with Russia. The Ukrainians were convinced the Russians would not invade. However, intel from the US Government turned out to be almost 100% accurate and on the 15th of February, the school went to online education due to warning from the state department. We began to evacuate away from Kyiv to places west. The exodus of people was significant. To date, 10 million Ukrainians have left their country, one of the largest refugee movements since WWII. Nick led a group of Americans to the Romanian border when they were able to cross Feb 27th, although they were waiting in line for 60 hours. Then it was Nick's turn to wait at the border preparing to cross. He had a ticket out of Kyiv if the airport remained open and wanted to get home because he had received word that his sister Cheri passed away. (WS grad 1977) He found that the flight to Frankfurt had been canceled and no western European airlines were selling tickets out of Ukraine anymore. He was finally able to get a flight out due to the partnership Air Ukraine had with Air France and landed safely in France. Eighteen hours later, the airport in Ukraine was bombed. There has been huge damage to the civilian infrastructure and the killing of many civilians. Nick says it has been truly amazing the way Ukrainians have demonstrated they will fight and die for their freedom.

"This has been a reminder to be thankful for our situation as Americans," Nick says. He also asks that we pray for these people and consider how to help. You may contact Nick for more information at Nick.Sweeney@KCA.org.UA.



West Seattle Monogram Club

The West Seattle Monogram Club was established in 1965 by the late Earl Lewis. Each year the West Seattle Monogram Club, composed of former West Seattle High School varsity athletes, raises money to help graduating West Seattle student athletes (male and female) pursue higher education. To our knowledge, no other public high school in the country has a not-for-profit club made up of former school varsity athletes dedicated to helping current student athletes pay for college

"We expect to award scholarships again this year, conducting the interviews at the high school" says Steve Palmer, club scholarship chairman.

Graduating varsity athletes are invited to apply for a Monogram Scholarship. Unlike most other scholarships, the candidates do not have to be at the top of the class academically. The Scholarship Committee looks for hardworking student athletes who need financial help to pursue a goal of higher education. Specifically, applicants have to be graduating seniors, have a varsity letter or a varsity "Monogram" earned in competition, a minimum of a 2.5 GPA, and have a thoughtful plan for his or her post-high school goal. The award is sent to the college or university to offset tuition.

The Club meets 11:00 am - 12:00 pm social and check in; 12:00 pm - 12:45 pm lunch, 12:45 - 1:30 pm program at the West Seattle Golf Course Club house on the first Tuesday of October, December, February and June. The lunch costs \$16.00 and includes tax and gratuity. You must make a reservation no later than seven days before the meeting date. The first Tuesday in August the Club is a "special luncheon" for members and guests and the club usually invites an important sports figure to be a guest speaker. SEATTLE SCHOOL DISTRICT ATHLETE HALL OF FAME Nomination Requirements

To be eligible as an individual student athlete, the following are required:

- 1. At least 10 years have passed since the candidate's year of graduation.
- 2. Candidate lettered in at least 1 sport twice or 2 sports at least once during their high school career.
- 3. Candidate exemplified sportsmanship, leadership, citizenship and teamwork as a high school athlete.
- 4. Candidate was selected as an All-City, All-State performer, State Champion, All-American National Champion OR has made a significant athletic contribution to high school, college or professional athletic competition.


To be eligible as a Team, no more than 1 team of athletes is eligible for nomination if the team, in one particular season and sport:


- 1. Won a State Championship, National Championship or made a significant contribution at any level of athletic competition.

- 4. The team left a "notable legacy" on SPD Athletics.


To be eligible as a Coach (or staff/supporter), no more that one individual coach, staff member or supporter of SPD is eligible IF:


- 1. More than 5 years have passed since candidate's service to SPD Athletics.


John Patrick "Pat" Vaughn, Jr **Faculty**

Arthur Oberto

Class of 1945 and Hall of Fame 2008 August 22, 1927 - August 26, 2022

The Passing of Art Oberto and Seattle's Quirky Character

Art Oberto loved family, sausage, jerky and Seattle. He also loved gimmicks. He was a character in the best sense of the word, an entrepreneur well before that term was a common part of the lexicon.

Seattle's sausage and jerky king died Friday at age 95. Oberto left behind four children, several grandchildren and great-grandchildren, and a legacy of turning business into fun.

On Sept. 6, it will have been 79 years since his father, Constantino, died and 16-yearold Arthur Oberto was plunged into running the family's sausage business alongside his mother, Antonietta. Constantino had started the company with sausage recipes he brought from Italy.

Long gone are the days when high schooler Art delivered sausages by bike so the company could survive. Expanding the product line, he built Oberto into one of the

nation's largest beef jerky companies.

Not all by himself, of course. His wife, Dorothy, was deeply involved and at one point kept the company books by hand. When she died in 2013, a Seattle Times story recounted that employees referred to her as the "company mom." Employees were an extension of her and Art's family; he regularly credited them for the company's success.

Part of Seattle's character is its quirkiness, and Oberto embraced the kitsch. A 1998 profile of the sausage king wrote, "Art Oberto's endeavors in publicity, the hydroplane his company sponsored, the Jerkymobile he drove, became cultural references in Seattle."

Yet his fame, like all fame, faded. "If you moved to Seattle after 1985, you might not recognize Art Oberto as a hat-wearing local celebrity, star of radio and television commercials and wholesale dispenser of free pens and stickers," the same profile noted.

He once called himself "unemployable, undependable and not too smart." He was everything but.

The company continued to evolve. After decades of use, its "Oh Boy" marketing slogan was retired in 2013 amid revamped packaging instituted for "a more modern look and feel." Five years later, the Oberto family sold the business to a Canadian food conglomerate, Premium Brand Holdings.

Oberto never got caught up in his own success, instead focusing on his family, his company and his community. He once called himself "unemployable, undependable and not too smart." He was everything

As longtime friend Dave Williams said in Saturday's news obituary, "He ran a large company, but he always told me everything you do has got to be good for everyone involved, or it's not worth doing."

Oberto's life was good for everyone involved, especially Seattle. It was most definitely worth living.

June Preston

Class of 1947 and Hall of Fame 1989

June Preston was an American child actress who went on to become an internationally renowned opera singer. At age 4 she made her screen debut as Mrs. Blewett's Daughter in Anne of Green Gables. Preston had paid a visit to the studio where a keen-eyed executive saw her and called for a screen test, which resulted in a 5-year contract. Preston acted, sang, and danced, becoming a worldwide celebrated child star who went on to work with Universal Studios, Warner Bros., 20th Century Fox, MGM, Republic Pictures, and Paramount Pictures.

After signing with RKO, she signed with Edward D. Schuwall of the Pottstown, Penn Clothing Firm in New York, who started a worldwide apparel line bearing the name 'June Preston Frock' by JP Loomcraft, better known now as Fruit of the Loom. Her products included dresses, coats, snowsuits, shoes, undergarments, beachwear, purses and hats. In addition there were other products that had her likeness on them such as dolls, paint sets, phonographs, and toys that sold millions worldwide.

Preston later became an internationally renowned opera singer. Her range varied from Spinto Soprano to Contralto. In 1952, at the age of 24, she was one of the youngest artists to debut her tour with the 'Stars of the Metropolitan Opera' in a leading role. The Metropolitan Opera South American Tour featured June as Mimi in La Bohème opposite Jan Peerce as Rodolfo. (In this role she originated a bit of stage business that has been used ever since, dropping her fur muff to the floor as Mimi dies in the last act.) She continued touring singing leading roles opposite Salvotore Vaccolini, Nicola

Mascono, Robert Weede, and again with Jan Peerce, and more.


Preston favored recitals above all, and was particularly well known for her concert recitals ranging from Beethoven, Mozart, Brahms to Puccini. She later began her American debut with the St. Louis Symphony, performing a recital of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony; followed by her 1962 European debut at the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam, thereafter touring all European countries in recitals. The majority of her performances were overseas until later in her career.

Her roles included: Micaela in Aida, Carmen in Carmen, Count Octavian Rofrano in Der Rosenkavalier, Adele in Die Fledermaus, Mimi in La Bohème, Violetta Valery in La Traviata, Cio-Cio-San in Madame Butterfly, Camille in The Merry Widow, Floria Tosca in Tosca, Turandot in Turandot.

Chris Thompson

Class of 1978

West Seattle's Thompson, Who Was Paralyzed in 1975, Dies at 62

Chris Thompson, who was paralyzed while playing football for West Seattle High School in 1975 and was awarded \$6.3 million in 1981 after filing a lawsuit against Seattle Public Schools, died from natural causes Monday in Seattle.

Thompson, who graduated from the University of Washington and owned horses that raced locally at Longacres in Renton and Emerald Downs in Auburn, was 62.

"He was absolutely to the core, a compas-

sionate person," said John Good, who first met Thompson at Madison Junior High in West Seattle. "His compassion really came out after his injury."

Thompson was named athlete of the year at Madison as a ninth-grader, and was the starting halfback for the West Seattle High football team as a sophomore. He was racing toward the end zone when he collided with a pair of tacklers. Thompson was unable to get up after suffering a spinal cord injury that left him quadriplegic. He was hospitalized for six months and eventually regained some use of his arms. Good, a friend of Thompson's since junior high, said Thompson was 100% paralyzed from the waist down and about 60% from the waist to the neck.

Thompson sued the school district, contending that coaches had not instructed him to avoid running with his head lowered. Good said Thompson negotiated a lower settlement after the district's insurance company threatened to appeal the \$6.3 million judgment. But the ruling in Thompson's favor helped pave the way for safety changes in the game.

Good said Thompson, who went on to earn a history degree at UW, was a "tremendous athlete." "He appeared to have a college, and maybe a major college (athletic) future if he hadn't suffered his injury," Good said.

Thompson became known as Mr. Inspiration to most of his West Seattle High School classmates, but was called "T-bone" by his closest friends.

Thompson, who split time as an adult between the Los Angeles area and Seattle, got his first horse in 1985 when he claimed Reardan's Gray at Longacres.

"He dearly loved his horses," Good said. "It was hard for Chris to get around, and when he went out, 99% of the time it was horse related: friends and family meeting him at the track or if they weren't racing, he would visit his horses out at the barn."

One of his top horses was Big Paz, who won 14 times, including a stakes race at Longacres and the Portland Meadows Mile. Big Paz won as a 10-year-old at Emerald Downs in 1996.

Thompson is survived by his wife, Cynda. Good said Thompson exceeded his life expectancy after the injury by 15 to 20 years.

"What a testament to resiliency Chris was," Good said. "He let (the injury) affect his life in the most intellectual way possible. 'What do I do with myself now?' It didn't decrease his will to live and his will to be a great friend, a great brother I just hope I somehow conveyed what a tremendous person he was."

Fred Utter

Class of 1950, Fisheries Professor

Fred Utter, who passed away 3/5/2023, was not only widely recognized as "the Founding Father of fishery genetics", he was "lovingly called 'Mother Utter'" by the numerous graduate students he nurtured and mentored over his prolific career. Fred graduated from the University of Puget Sound in 1954 with a degree in chemistry, followed by a Masters in Fisheries from UW and a PhD in genetics from UC-Davis.

Between 1969 and 1988 he led the genetics group at the National Marine Fisheries Service. He was an affiliate professor at the UW, editor of the Transaction of American Fisheries Society and the North American Journal of Fisheries Management. In addition, he authored well over 100 scientific publications, including co-editing "Population Genetics and Fisheries Management:, a text still used as standard in the field.

His work lives on through a new generation of fisheries scientists.

Citizens Save and Move Historic Stone Cottage; Next Step is to Find a Permanent Shoreline Home By Clay Eals

Remember the tiny, charming 1930s cottage at the north end of Harbor Avenue that was covered by 15,000 stones from Alki Beach? Most graduates of West Seattle High School can say an enthusiastic "Yes!"

It was threatened by a new condo development, but a grassroots citizens organization raised funds and saved the 800-square-foot structure by moving it one mile south in 2021 to a temporary site owned by the Port of Seattle, where it stands protected on an elevated platform today.

Of course, its journey isn't over. The citizens organization — Save the Stone Cottage LLC, whose nonprofit fundraising vehicle is the Southwest Seattle Historical Society — is exploring options with Seattle Parks and Recreation to secure a permanent, prominent home for the building.

Ideal sites include Alki Beach Park between the Alki Bathhouse and the Statue of Liberty replica, Don Armeni Park across from the cottage's original site and Seacrest Park near the King County Water Taxi dock.

The building was donated to Save the Stone Cottage LLC by the condo contractor Chainqui Development. The underlying goal of the LLC is to give the structure to the city and locate it at a visible and well-used waterfront spot, where it would be elevated to protect against tidal damage resulting from climate change and receive significant public use and appreciation.



"This campaign has taken a lot of work by a variety of community partners over the past few years, and we have a long way to go," says Mike Shaughnessy of Save the Stone Cottage LLC. "But we are thrilled to have preserved this unique treasure, and we are optimistic about a favorable outcome."

The Stone Cottage was built by the family of longtime Harbor Avenue resident Eva Falk during the Great Depression. Eva and her mother came up with its unusual façade of more than 15,000 stones, which they gathered from the beach near Alki Lighthouse, transported in children's wagons to its original site at 1123 Harbor Ave. S.W. and thoughtfully placed by hand on the exterior of the building.

Potential uses for the Stone Cottage include Seattle Parks programming, security and storage space and as a possible West Seattle visitor center. The LLC also envisions that on-site interpretive materials will tell the building's fascinating backstory.

The one-mile move of the stone-studded structure on Aug. 18, 2021, was an exciting event witnessed by hundreds. Reflecting the strength of the building, not a single stone fell off the cottage during the all-night move. The successful move was recognized by a preservation award by Historic Seattle.

Funds still need to be raised for cottage restoration and for its eventual permanent placement. The LLC also pays rent to the Port of Seattle for temporary storage.






It is assumed – but not confirmed – that Ellie may be the only surviving member of the 1939 class. She looks back with fondness on her student days at West Seattle High, where her late brothers Justin and Ted Comeaux graduated with the classes of 1934 and 1939, respectively.

"It was a good basis for being prepared for college," she recalls. "We had great teachers."

Ellie went on to attend the University of Washington, majoring in engineering and then working for several years at Boeing as one of the company's first female engineers. It was at the UW that she met her future husband, Norm Riddell, a Lincoln High grad who eventually became a dentist and practiced briefly in Ballard before moving with Ellie and their young son and daughter to Juneau, Alaska in the late 1950s. The family witnessed Alaska's arrival to statehood in January 1959. The Riddells five years later welcomed a second son to their household.

Ellie and her family lived an adventurous life for more than three decades in Alaska, as her outdoorsman husband took them on many hunting, fishing, boating and hiking trips. But with two of their three children now fully grown, Norm retired from his dental practice and he and Ellie and their youngest son returned to Washington, settling in Anacortes in 1979.

What happened two years later required Ellie to draw deeply on her faith in God and her positive attitude about life. While Ellie was at home in Anacortes, Norm piloted a small plane along the southeast Alaska coast, accompanied by three family members. To this day, what happened to the plane in July 1981 is a mystery; the Coast Guard searched for weeks and never found it. What is now simply called "The Accident" took the lives of Norm, their oldest son, that son's wife and Sandy's first husband. By late 1981 Sandy and her newborn baby boy moved down from Juneau to Anacortes to live with Ellie and her

one remaining brother. Sandy two years later remarried and her new husband adopted her little boy and three more children later arrived.

While the loss of so many loved ones was a terrible blow for the family, Ellie never let this diminish her zest for life. She has been blessed over the years with the love of her many grandchildren and great-grandchildren. She enjoyed travel to many foreign countries and developed an increasing interest in the world of finance. Even today she finds it fun to keep up with the ups and downs of the economic sector, thanks to her constant attention to the Bloomberg financial channel on TV.

Her energy as a dedicated very senior walker made her a popular sight to her many friends in Anacortes, and is also turning her into a bit of a celebrity now in Newberg. She also is one of about 1,500 centenarians – people 100 years or older – who are part of an ongoing national study by the Boston University School of Medicine. The study looks at every aspect of each participant's life, including family background, job history, interests, health and more.

In Ellie's case, in order to stay current that study may need to ask her for additional information, because she aims to stick around for a while.

"My goal is 110," she says.

Alice Enevoldsen, Class of 1999, Stargazing Host, Teacher

Alice Enevoldsen, a WSHS graduate, is the host of the stargazing events that are held at Solstice Park, above the tennis courts on Fauntleroy Way, at every Equinox, the third week in September and March and the Solstice during the third week of June and December (weather permitting).

While still at WSHS, Alice began her career by taking advantage of the Running Start program and took calculus at South Seattle College. As a current faculty member at South Seattle, Alice has a number of Running Start students from West Seattle; "I enjoy chatting with them about the school".

After finishing at both West Seattle and South Seattle, Alice continued her edu-

cation with two years of undergraduate work at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) in physics, later transferring to Whitman College in Walla Walla, where she completed her degree in Astronomy-Geology.

Next, she moved on to Seattle University's intensive one-year Masters in Teaching Program, student teaching back at WSHS, earning both her Masters and her certificate in Secondary Education, focused on the sciences.

Also still at WSHS, Alice began giving planetarium shows at the Pacific Science Center, a phase of her career that lasted 17 years, culminating with 5 years as the planetarium Director.

In 2016, Alice pivoted to teaching astronomy back at South Seattle College, in all modalities: in person, online, hybrid and synchronous online.

Alice brings that extensive experience and training to bear in making her classes as innovative, active and inclusive as possible, pulling from activities designed for all levels of teaching, as well as from current research on best practices in teaching and learning, diversity, equity and inclusion.

Alice lives in West Seattle with her 6- and 12-year old children and her partner, Jason.



Of her years at West Seattle HS, Alice reflects:

"There are three programs at WS that opened opportunities for me that I wouldn't have had otherwise:

• The Genetics Program with Ms. Mitchell, which was grant-funded through Immunex and the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Center; I think it was called the High School Human Genome Project. This

was a biology class where we did real work with genetics. In class, we sequenced part of the human genome and inserted a gene into a specific bacteria. We learned that scientists are always learning. I credit this program entirely for making first-year biology at MIT a breeze. My hands-on experience in high school enabled me to tutor my MIT classmates, and I truly believe that most of my genetics class peers would also have been able to do so.

- The Computer Club: while we didn't install the first two computers classrooms on campus, we did install the first fiber-optic cable to those classrooms, as well as installing the first computer lab in the library in addition to the new computer lab classroom. These were made possible by grants from Microsoft. A Microsoft recruiter also met with us and offered us interviews for their summer high school internships, one of which I was offered and subsequently accepted.
- Marine Biology with Craig MacGowan. He was only at WSHS briefly, on his way to retirement after a full career at Garfield, but in the second semester of my senior year, we got lucky. Our class learned deeply in this course, with weekly water monitoring, intense memorization, project-based learning and at least three major field trips. We learned so deeply that we often texted our new terms such as 'vellela, vellela' (a genus of floating oceanic siphonophores) within our group.

I would be remiss if I did not mention the influence of Jeff Ursino has had on my career, both as my high school chemistry teacher and, later, as one of my mentors during my student teaching."

"Unfortunately, naming every teacher who had an impact on me would end up being a very long list, so I apologize for leaving off here."

and began to attack her. Leaving the carriage behind, the young mother headed up the street, hoping to lead the attacker away from her young child. While this selfless act did protect the baby, it left the mother at the assailant's mercy.

Bruce soon realized he was the only one around who might come to the mother's aid, and if he didn't act right away, he might literally witness a murder. There wasn't even time to call 911, but Bruce reasoned that a neighbor would eventually see what was happening and report the emergency. In the meantime, Bruce knew he had to get himself between the assailant and the victim and do whatever possible to keep them apart - so he stepped into the street and came face to face with the attacker.

Twice the frenzied woman threatened Bruce, holding up the weapon, saying "Get out of the way, I've got a knife." This was something of an understatement because the weapon was shaped more like a cleaver. At one point she was holding it so close to Bruce's face that he considered making a grab for it. But recalling that he was 79 years old, and neither as quick nor as strong as he once was, Bruce decided to simply hold his ground. Saying nothing, he kept blocking the way_ to the victim by moving from side to side whenever the attacker tried to get around him. Eventually, a number of onlookers began to gather, and to Bruce's relief, a voice cried out, "911 has been called."

Finally, sirens could be heard coming up the street, and the attacker turned and began rapidly walking away toward California Avenue. Afraid she might escape once she got to the busy thoroughfare, Bruce followed her, and when a police car sped by, he was able to point out exactly where she was. At last, when Bruce heard a police-

man's voice sternly call out, "Drop that knife," he knew the danger was over.

Fortunately, when the victim was later examined at the hospital it was clear that all her injuries could be successfully treated. Perhaps most importantly, during the stand-off with the attacker, alert neighbors had brought the baby carriage into their yard, and then taken the young child inside for safety. The unharmed infant was soon reunited with his mother

After this incident both Bruce and the victim of the attack appeared on local TV stations, and both were interviewed on the popular Dori Monson radio show on KIRO-FM. In 2018, Bruce received the prestigious Honor Medal from the National Court of Honor of the Boy Scouts of America, "for unusual heroism in saving ... life at considerable risk to self."
